Curriculum Map: Advanced Theatre Meadville Area Senior High School English Department

Course Description: This course is an expanded study of the elements of theatre which include various playwrights, acting, staging, design and construction, direction and stage management. Students will create and maintain a portfolio of theatre information and research. The students will read and analyze different types of plays and prepare and perform scenes, as well as a final one-act production.
